Third Age Trust

Mike Warren, Fergus & Mike Barlow attended a Zoom update about the future organisation of the Third Age Trust management structure. There was a request to ensure that all our members are kept informed as these proposals are refined

u3a's in the UK are managed by The <u>Third Age Trust Board</u>. This body has a responsibility to ensure that u3a's comply with a number of governance and financial regulations - mainly defined by the Charity Commission. This takes the majority of their time and effort and means they have little time to address other topics. With more than 1000 u3a's across the UK it has been obvious for some time that the existing management structure needs reviewing. There is a project called FFTF (Fit for the Future) which is making a proposal to split the Third Age Trust responsibilities into two bodies. There will continue to be a <u>Board</u> to address Governance and Financial issues and this will be complemented by a new <u>Council</u> that will improve two way communication of Members' issues and provide a forum for faster decision making.

More information will be provided as the proposals are refined, and later in the year Tiverton u3a will be asked to vote for or against the proposals. -- *Mike Barlow*

The range of photos came from around the globe to very local and from the depths of

time to very recent.

Nigel regaled us with exceptional wintry scenes from, Bickleigh, Culmstock Beacon, Wellington and Waterow to the depths of Suffolk and the Mackinnon Pass (1154m) on South Island, New Zealand.

Mike was a bit more local with great shots showing contrasting colours and a beautifully shot rainbow over Anstey Common and images of trees and flora around Knightshayes.

Tim's time machine didn't disappoint. A rare 1965 photo of farmland around Higher Moor Farm, now Moorhayes housing, and a fallen tree blown over by storm Eunice in 2022 which has righted itself and continues to grow!


piece of food left, you know that members have absolutely enjoyed the meal. The staff were happy and gave wonderful service to all throughout.
