

Exe-estuary.org refers to Dawlish Warren as an incredibly rich area botanically, with 620 species of plant including the Early Meadow Grass and the Warren Crocus. The site also supports over 2000 different species of invertebrates including the Ruddy Darter, Hairy Dragonflies, and the Scarlet and Jersey Tiger Moths.

The Blue Ball sits in the pretty hamlet of Sampford Moor, just 3 miles from Wellington, 9 miles from Taunton.


